Day 1: Thur, Jun 18 – HONOLULU. Depart Honolulu via Japan Airlines flt #73 at 11:55 am.

Day 2: Fri, Jun 19 – TOKYO. Arrive at the Haneda International Airport at 3:55 pm. After entry formalities, transfer by coach to the hotel in Tokyo. A Welcome buffet dinner has been arranged at the hotel. KEIO PLAZA HOTEL TOKYO (4 Nights) (D)

Day 3: Sat, Jun 20 – TOKYO. After breakfast, begin your first day in Tokyo at the all-new **TeamLab Art Museum – Azabudai Hills**. “TeamLab Borderless is a world of artworks without boundaries, a museum without a map created by art collective TeamLab. Artworks move out of rooms, relate to other works, influence each other, and at times intermingle, without boundaries. Through this group of works, one continuous world without boundaries is created. Immerse your body in borderless art. Wander, explore with intention, discover, and create a world with others.” Next, take in the view of the surrounding city from the observation deck of the **Tokyo Skytree**. At just over 2,000 feet tall, it is the tallest tower in Tokyo. Rising 350 meters above the ground, the Tokyo Skytree Tembo Deck offers a 360° panoramic view of Tokyo. Then spend some free time at **Solamachi**, a large shopping, dining, and entertainment complex at the base of the Tokyo Skytree. After lunch (on your own), enjoy a fun-filled, hands-on activity, as you **paint your own furin (Japanese wind chime)**. A wonderful souvenir of this trip! Return to the hotel. The remainder of the day is at your leisure. The Local Guide will have suggestions for nearby shopping and dining options. (B)

Day 4: Sun, Jun 21 – TOKYO. First visit **Meiji Shrine**, the Shinto shrine dedicated to the deified spirits of the Emperor Meiji and his wife, Empress Shoken. Next head to **Asakusa**, the center of Tokyo’s shitamachi (literally “low city”) districts, where an atmosphere of the Tokyo of past decades survives. Asakusa’s main attraction is **Sensoji**, a very popular Buddhist temple built in the 7th century. The temple is approached via the **Nakamise**, a shopping street that has been providing temple visitors with a variety of traditional local snacks and tourist souvenirs for centuries. Continue shopping at **COREDO Muromachi**, a shopping and entertainment complex located in the historic Nihonbashi district at the very heart of the city. You’ll find stores – some of them dating back centuries – showcasing the finest traditional crafts and gourmet foods from all over Japan, including knives, ceramics, gourmet soy sauce, tea, and confectionery. **You’re in for a treat tonight!** Enjoy dinner and a show at **Suigian**. It’s the only venue where various schools of Japan’s traditional performing arts, such as Noh, Kyogen, and Nihonbuyo, are presented on a daily basis. The bowls and plates used to serve the cuisine are vintage items from the Edo (1603–1867), Meiji (1868–1912), and Taisho (1912–26) Periods. On stage, the performers have their own microphones and provide explanations so that audience members can enjoy the show even without prior knowledge of Japan’s traditional performing arts. (B, D)

Day 5: Mon, Jun 22 – TOKYO. Day at leisure. Perfect day to relax and/or visit with family and friends in Tokyo. Your Local Guide will be available to assist as needed. (B)

Day 6: Tue, Jun 23 – TOKYO – YOKOHAMA – EMBARK DIAMOND PRINCESS. After a delicious breakfast at the hotel, depart the hotel for Yokohama. Begin the day at **Shin-Yokohama Ramen Museum**, the world’s first ramen-themed amusement park. Founded in 1994, it was created to be the one-stop place to enjoy the flavors of this national dish from renowned shops across Japan without having to step on a plane. Learn about the history and culture of ramen. Then take part in a **ramen making experience**, where you will make noodles using the traditional Chinese method of “green bamboo beating” and enjoy learning how flour is transformed into ramen. You’ll get to enjoy your creation for lunch, before transferring to the pier for embarkation on the Diamond Princess. (B, L, D)

Day 14: Wed, Jul 01 – AT SEA. (B, L, D)

Day 15: Thur, Jul 02 – YOKOHAMA – DISEMBARK DIAMOND PRINCESS – TOKYO – HONOLULU. After disembarkation, spend free time exploring **Minato Mirai 21**, which offers a wide range of shopping opportunities. The Landmark Plaza and Queen’s Towers have many floors filled with the typical sorts of shops and restaurants that one would expect to find at shopping malls. Queen’s Square is located in the lower floors of the three Queen’s Towers. They offer a variety of shops and restaurants, including various well known brand stores. The Landmark Plaza is located just beside Queen’s Square and is located adjacent to the Landmark Tower. The five floors of the Landmark Plaza feature a similar variety of shops and restaurants to those found in the Queen’s Towers, including a Pokémon Center on the 4th floor. On the man-made island in the Shinko district, shoppers will find a more unique selection of goods at the World Porters Mall and Red Brick Warehouses. The World Porters Mall has six floors, with each one dedicated to a certain theme. From the ground floor up, they are food, fashion, sports and hobby, home and living, Broadway (cinema), relaxation and interiors. The Broadway floor has a movie theater and amusement center. The food floor includes an extensive supermarket. Next, explore **Toyosu Senkyaku Banrai**, a shopping complex that recreates an Edo period neighborhood. Toyosu Senkyaku Banrai offers fresh food from the neighboring Toyosu Market and serves to showcase the best foods in Tokyo. Enjoy time for shopping and lunch (on your own), exploring the offerings at the numerous stalls. If you get tired, head up to the 8th floor and relax at the foot bath garden – which is free of charge to all visitors. Finally, visit **Ameyoko**, a busy market street along the Yamanote Line tracks between Okachimachi and Ueno Stations. The name “Ameyoko” is a short form for “ameya yokocho” (“candy store alley”), as candies were traditionally sold there. Alternatively, “Ame” also stands for “America,” because a lot of American products used to be available there when the street was the site of a black market in the years following WWII. Today, various products such as clothes, bags, cosmetics, fresh fish, dried food, and spices are sold along Ameyoko. Transfer to the airport for the flight home. Depart Haneda International Airport via Japan Airlines flt #72 at 9:55 pm and arrive Honolulu at 9:55 am the same day. Aloha and welcome home! (B)
